The Holy Mountain emerges as an enigmatic monolith, its faceted pink resin surface evoking the raw geometry of an otherworldly rock formation. At first glance, it appears as a singular, immovable mass—solid, impenetrable, and self-contained. Yet this illusion is swiftly undone as the work reveals an integrated speaker system, transforming the monolith into an unexpected conduit for sound.
